- Ramadan and Eid


We create all the slides ourselves and share them with Mr Borthwick on the MS Team we are all members of.







Last session we read some diverse book titles and picked which ones we liked best for class or novel sets. We displayed book reviews on our display board for people to read. This session we have developed our project further...




We have carried out audits of class libraries in P6 and P7. We sorted books based on equalities characteristics and removed some books we didn't think were appropriate!


Here we are carrying out a library audit...








We looked through the list of recommended Equalities themed novels and picked some for Early, First and Second Level. This is our wish list of new novels.



We applied for an Anti- Racist Small Grants Fund to buy the books from our wish list. We were awarded £500 and have ordered some of the books from our wish list.



We created a MS Form for children in P4-P7 to ask them if they see themselves represented in the novels and books they use in school.



- We need a wider range of reading books in school!




We launched the new books we bought at assembly and shared the results of the survey too.

We helped out with setting up the café and serving customers!






Young People's Equalities Event


P1 Transition Event
